Evaluation report (score: 97.8%)

- The project offers an innovative, original and creative approach.
- The research programme offers a variety of disciplinary perspectives.
- The research programme is very well integrated with the training of ESRs.
- The training programme suggests extremely useful transferable skills with regard to translating scientific research to policy.
- The interlinkages between non-academic and academic partners is successfully demonstrated.
- A dense and frequent interaction between the participating organisations is very well demonstrated.

Application

Evaluation report (score: 97.8%)

- Some doubts remain on the conceptual framework.
- Types, objectives and outlets of academic publications planned are not very clearly presented.

Tips (from my experience)

- However long you think the application will take, double it.
- The REA likes consortia that have history.
- The Gantt chart is your friend. Know what ESRs will do for each of the 36 months.
- The REA treats social science and natural science programmes the same:
 - Build in time for ethnographic fieldwork. The REA will not allow you to exceed the 30% limit.
 - Make it clear that social science PhDs do not always end up where you expect them to. Even though this is perfectly normal, the REA will see this as a 'deviation' from the GA.
