## **Horizon Europe participation**

On 24 December 2020, the negotiations on the UK-EU Trade and Cooperation Agreement concluded

The <u>announcement</u> confirmed that the intention of the UK is to associate **to Horizon Europe** 

This includes **full participation in the programme** (with the exception of the EIC Accelerator Investment Fund)

UK entities can participate in/coordinate projects and receive funding from Horizon Europe

UKRO <u>website</u> provides latest information on UK participation





## **Commission Q&A**

#### European Commission's Q&A confirms UK eligibility to apply:

"UK entities including universities, research centres, scientists, innovative businesses, industry, etc. can participate in the first calls for proposals of Horizon Europe as soon as they are published on the European Commission's website."

"...UK applicants are treated as if the UK is an associated country throughout the process, from admissibility and eligibility to evaluation, up until the preparation of grant agreements."





## **Delay to UK Association**

- In November 2021, the UK government announced the <u>Horizon</u>
   <u>Europe Guarantee</u>
  - Covers all eligible current applications to calls with a call deadline before 31 Dec 2022
  - UK government will continue to monitor the situation and may update the guarantee if necessary
- On 20 July 2022, the UK Government <u>announced</u> a further package of measures to support applicants affected by the delays
  - Will only come into force if the UK does not associate
  - Will cover third country participation
  - They will ensure that there is no funding gap

#### The intention of the UK is still to associate to Horizon Europe

There is broad consensus on people, culture & talent (PC&T) related CHALLENGES in the R&I system

- Skills shortages (and a failure to develop and support a diversity of people with potential across varied roles)
- Narrow / stunted career paths
- Variable quality of leadership
- Research culture that's not deemed to be open & inclusive
- Incentives that reward only a narrow range of contributions / people
- A risk of losing out to **global** competition for talent


Visa route	What does it enable?
Global Talent	<ul> <li>Working in the UK if the applicant is a leader or potential leader in one of the following fields:</li> <li>Academia or research</li> <li>Arts &amp; culture</li> <li>Digital technology</li> <li>Subject to Endorsing Body criteria</li> </ul>
Skilled Worker	Skilled workers who have a job offer from an approved employer sponsor
Temporary Worker - HEI & GAE routes	Facilitates the sharing of knowledge, experience and best practice through work placements, training, and project collaboration (up to 24 months). Cannot be used to fill job vacancies or to bring unskilled labour to the UK. Sponsorship is available through HEIs or UKRI approved institutes.

# **The Global Talent visa**

For talented or promising individuals working in **academia or research**; arts and culture or digital technology.





# Why is it important to use the GTV?

You need to apply for best visa for your situation. If you, you could face:

- lengthy application processes
- unnecessary additional steps
- delays to projects
- unnecessary costs to the project

# Using the Global Talent visa

## One visa, four routes to endorsement

YES

Have you accepted the offer of an **academic or research appointment** at an institution approved by the British Academy, Royal Academy of Engineering and Royal Society?

NO

If you have been offered a role with responsibility for academic, research or innovation leadership and development **OR** for directing or leading an individual or team research or innovation project or programme of work, you need a statement of guarantee from the HR Director or equivalent at the employing institution confirming that certain recruitment requirements were met to support your application for a fast-track visa.

Have you been awarded an **individual fellowship** on the list approved by the British Academy, Royal Academy of Engineering and Royal Society?

Are you working on a research grant<sup>™</sup> issued by an **endorsed funder** on the list approved by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI)?

NO

Check the eligibility and assessment criteria for standard endorsement and submit an application for **peer review** by the British Academy, Royal Academy of Engineering or Royal Society<sup>\*\*\*</sup>.



YES If your fellowship is listed and you hold it currently or have done so within the last 12 months, you must submit a copy of the award letter as part of your fast-track visa application. **Update: Fellowship** must be current or held within the last **5 years** before the date of application.

YES If you as an individual or your role is named in a successful grant application from an endorsed funder, you need to submit both the award letter and a statement of guarantee from the employing or hosting institution as part of your application for a fast-track visa. The funder and the institution must both be on the approved UKRI list.

# **Endorsed Funder route**


- Researcher & teams working on grants from
   <u>UKRI recognised Endorsed Funders</u>
- Applicants are required to be employed or hosted at a <u>UKRI approved host organisation</u>
- Use for MSCA COFUND & MSCA Doctoral Networks
- The list of Endorsed Funders is large (>90 funders) and continuously expanding

Are you working on a research grant<sup>\*</sup> issued by an **endorsed funder** on the list approved by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI)?

# Eligibility

Are you working on a research grant<sup>\*</sup> issued by an **endorsed funder** on the list approved by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI)?



Applicant must independently direct, or direct under supervision, a unique research or innovation project OR

they must make critical contributions to research through the provision of core technical or domain excellence, or in developing new technologies and methodologies



## Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS)

Applies to international students and researchers who are subject to UK immigration control and are intending to study or research at postgraduate level in certain sensitive subjects

Researchers and students in these sensitive subjects must apply for an ATAS certificate before they can study or start research in the UK

\*Students and researchers who are nationals of EU countries, the European Economic Area (EEA), Australia, Canada, Japan, New Zealand, Singapore, South Korea, Switzerland or the United States of America **do not need an ATAS certificate**.
